One of the first artists to ever capture my imagination was Normal Rockwell. I love his detailed depiction of Americana, the way he includes little hints of the story behind the story. Made famous by his many 'Saturday Evening Post' covers, the work I most often think of is his "Four Freedoms" series: Freedom from Want, Freedom of Speech, Freedom from Fear, and Freedom of Worship.

While much can be said about these four oil paintings, my mind is drawn to the

prepositions in the titles. Freedom, as it turns out, can be "from" and "of" something—and it can also be "for" or "to" something. Freedom *from* want means freedom *for* abundance, generosity, and gratitude. Freedom *of* speech means freedom *to* advocate for those who have no voice. Freedom *from* fear means (as it says in 1st John 4:18) freedom *for* love, because "perfect love casts out fear."

When Jesus stepped into his ministry, he did not do so as a powerful influencer or a gentle guru. In many ways, Jesus led like a revolutionary. He talked about changing kingdoms, predicted the fall of Jerusalem,





and worked in secret until the time was right to reveal his hand. And most revolutionary of all was Jesus' work as *liberator*.

Wherever he went, Jesus turned the power dynamics upside-down. In a time when it seemed like the best route to freedom was a Jewish army rebelling against the Romans, Jesus drew his followers to another way. Instead of predicting his triumphant ascension to a throne in Jerusalem, Jesus predicted his death. And instead of showing us disciples who "get it," the gospel of Mark joins Jesus in this upside-down initiative by showing us unnamed women who (over and over) have a clear understanding of what it means to give your whole life to Christ.

All this upside-down movement was Jesus' way to **set us free**. Rather than being bound by our scarcity or ailment, Jesus provides healing and food for the journey. Rather than being bound by our own ambitions to be 'the greatest in God's kingdom,' Jesus frees us for a life of humble service.

Jesus did not come to give us overly burdened lives – he came that we might have life and have it abundantly! By the power of the Spirit, we can be set free from each thing that binds us. What better way to prepare for the resurrection?

May you find freedom *from* your chains – and may Christ set you free *for* a life of abundant love and grace.

Ash Wednesday



Missions Corner

Baltimore County Christian Workcamp

The 41st annual BCCW will occur July 21-27, 2024. Its mission is home repair and assistance for the needy in Baltimore County by volunteers of all ages. Hunt's Church has been supporting BCCW financially and with volunteers since the beginning.

In addition to or in lieu of volunteering during the July week to help with house repairs, another way to support BCCW is by financially giving to Hunt's special Lenten offering, which, for decades, has been split



between (1) BCCW to help fund building supplies and materials, and (2) Camp Hope to help fund the Hunt's Senior Highs trip to go for a week to repair homes in the Western Maryland area.

Your support of BCCW through the Lenten offering is appreciated. Ramps which have been "Hunt's Team's" preferred work projects, especially for the past decade, vary in cost from \$750 to \$2,000+ per ramp, depending on their length and complexity; historically, we have tried to do two ramps during each BCCW week, except during a shortened "COVID" week in 2020 and when we spent a full week on a164' ramp system, which is BCCW's longest ramp effort. Some years we have even built a third ramp too in the Fall (like in 2023).

The next BCCW planning meeting on Tuesday, February 6, will be virtual only via Google Meet at 7:00 pm. This is an open

meeting for anyone interested in BCCW. If you would like the link, contact Howard Lin or Steve Lippy. Update on Possible Jubilee Micro-Lending Mission

We have held three information sessions for a possible new mission: the Jubilee Micro-Lending Program. Eight people attended the sessions. After learning about the program, all attendees agreed it is a good idea and five people have volunteered to work on implementing this mission at Hunt's.

One question that came up during an info session was: How is this mission different from the Start A Business - Change Your Life Program? These missions are different in two key ways: 1) the Jubilee mission would be a mission created and operated by Hunt's (modeled after a successful program at Good Shepherd Church), the Start A Business program was created by the Urban Poverty & Business Initiative and is being implemented in Baltimore



by Morgan State University with support from Hunt's and several other organizations; 2) the Jubilee mission would involve Hunt's directly helping disadvantaged individuals and small businesses with small "loans" which they repay, the Start a Business program is a comprehensive training and support program for disadvantaged entrepreneurs. The missions are complementary, yet each is unique.

During discussions in the information sessions a few points have emerged. The Jubilee mission would be a high impact mission with a relatively low labor or volunteer hour requirement. We estimate that 3-5 people could define the ground rules for the Jubilee Mission in several one to two-hour work sessions. Then funds would be solicited for this mission. Finally, a three to five-person review committee would be formed to review and approve applications. This committee would initially meet quarterly or every 2 months. The mission would be evaluated after one year and any needed adjustments made.

Update on "Start a Business – Change Your Life"

Everything is on track for a February 10th launch of Cohort 2 of this 10-month program to help people with low incomes create a sustainable business. As of January 28th, 148 people have applied to the Program. There is only space to accommodate 60 people in the training room, so the remainder are on a waiting list and have the first chance to sign up for Cohort 3 which will start February 15, 2025.

Moment in Time: 1922 Roldrew Avenue Appears on the Map

Many interesting roads and avenues twist and turn throughout the Ruxton/ Riderwood area. One of these, **Roldrew Avenue**, just down the hill from Hunt's Church, has a particularly interesting history, one that explains both its unusual name and how it got its start. It all began with two local residents who were Hunt's Church members back in the early 1920's.


The following description comes from a family memoir written in 1975 by Louis R. Andrew, at the time a member at Hunt's for 72 years. The following excerpt from his notes provides a peek at the part he played in Riderwood's early land development in 1922.

When the war came [WW1] the private carpentry work I had been doing dried up. Rev. Heavener, our new pastor at Hunt's, knew the main superintendent at the Maryland Shipyard and introduced me to him, and I began work there in the ship refinishing department. By the time the Armistice was signed in 1918, I was managing a crew of 15 men. This success and experience gave me the push to start my own carpentry business, R.L Andrew, with my wife Mary as secretary. Things went well.... In 1922, Roy Roller [a friend and fellow church member] and I bought the old property in the Riderwood area nicknamed Jigger Hill and cut an avenue through it, naming it **Roldrew** [combination of Roller and Andrew.]

Louis Andrew, later to become known as "Uncle Lou" by his fellow church members, went on to describe how he and Roy Roller began building and selling houses along **Roldrew Avenue**, later running a second avenue to the stream and calling it **Willow**. As he put it, "We built quite a little village." In the beginning he explained they even dug a well and ran water pipes to some of the properties, supplying water for \$60 a year until they sold out to the county which then ran new pipes and installed meters.

Longtime Hunt's Church member Jim Shaffer has many memories of Louis Andrew and his family. As a youth, he recalls a variety of part-time jobs helping out "Uncle" Lou and "Aunt" Mary, later working for their son Wilson and his wife Lib in their farm/orchard/nursery business. The last Riderwood land transaction "Uncle" Lou made was the sale of 1.75 acres (a double lot) on Willow Avenue to Jim's parents, fellow church members Walter and Ruth Shaffer. In 1974, Jim built a home on this Willow Avenue property. He and his wife Candy reside there today.

The Andrew family and the Roller family were actively involved in every aspect of life at Hunt's Church as well as being "movers



and shakers" in the surrounding area as it began to emerge from rural farmland into a residential community. The Andrew construction company also played a major role in Hunt's Church's early restorations and additions. The church's 1924 addition, 1933 fire restoration, and 1973 wing were all Andrew company construction projects.

Financial News: The Year Ahead!

In January's newsletter, I updated you on our 2023 financial performance and thanked you for your generous response to our year-end appeal. Your fantastic response helped us reduce the shortfall we were facing, which was a relief for your Finance Committee. Well, we need your help again in 2024. Your Church Council approved the 2024 operating budget at its January meeting. The budget continues to support the rejuvenated ministries and missions of the church and fully funds all staff positions and other operating expenses expected to be incurred sometime this year. Although the budget reflects a shortfall of just under \$60,000, the council believes it is important to support all the good things happening these days at Hunt's.

This table summarizes the key components of the budget compared to last year's actual results (note: the preschool is budgeted separately).

As you can see, we have budgeted a shortfall of over \$59,000. While this is a bit uncomfortable and not ideal, the church has adequate reserves to cover the budget gap in the short term. For example, our operating fund ended 2023 with a balance of \$71,000. This is the first place we would look to cover any shortfall. Our challenge going forward is to grow our giving to support our operating expenses.

Over the last three years, we have seen offerings increase in the 5-6% range annually after many years of flat or decreased giving. We have assumed the trend of increased giving will continue in 2024, and therefore, we budgeted a 4% increase in offerings. We would ask you to prayerfully consider how you can support the church this year with your time, talent, and treasures. Please consider if you can "grow one step" and increase your financial support this year.
