Do you live in a "red" or "blue" household?

With the 2O24 presidential election just two months away, we all know that this question is about more than your favorite color. Our world seems more divided than ever into ideological silos - and too many of us hunker down into our own 'side,' hoping that we can simply talk about something else until this all 'blows over.'

The only problem is...it won't blow over. No single election can answer the heart-question: How can we stay in relationship with people who don't think like us?

This fall, our church is joining congregations across the country in a "Do Unto Others" Campaign for Kindness. Instead of staying in our "red" and "blue" zones, we will make Hunt's Church into a "purple" zone: a place where we can do common good even when we don't share much common ground.

When we follow the example of Jesus, our witness in Ruxton-Riderwood rises higher than any single issue or election. By performing daily acts of kindness, compassion, humility, respect, and love, we live out our prayers and become a balm for a world so desperately in need of healing. This is the most important way you can share your faith in this challenging political season.

This fall, you're invited to join the Campaign for Kindness. We'll have free yard signs available here at the church, allowing you to campaign in your

neighborhood - not for any political issue or individual, but for the kind of world Jesus taught us to create in his name.

Our nation's problems are deeper than any single election - but we are blessed with a Savior greater than any single candidate. May we be faithful followers of Jesus, showing the world what 'heaven on earth' can be when we Do Unto Others together.

Reconciling Ministries

Why it still matters

When the 2024 General Conference recently voted to change UMC policies and end overt discrimination against LGTBQ+ people, many thought that the work of the Reconciling Ministries Network was done. While this was a major accomplishment, it is really just one big step on our journey to become a truly welcoming and inclusive community.

Equally important to policy change is our need to change our hearts and our minds, and to change our practice, so that we live out our stated values. When we make a commitment to change our hearts and minds, we are just following the vision of John Wesley that we can "love alike" even if we do not "think alike." When we change our practices, we are following our baptismal covenant to show love and support to everyone.

There are many steps big and small that we can take to fulfill these critical components. Some of the possible steps we may consider are:

- Creating a dialogue with the congregation to build a better understanding of LGTBQ+ congregants and potential congregants.
- Developing a welcoming spirit at our Church for all who might walk through our doors.
- Creating support groups and being a "safe place" for LGTBQ+ groups to meet.
- Focusing outreach efforts toward members of the LGTBQ+ community to let them know that our Church is a welcoming Church.
- Committing to using inclusive language and respectfully recognizing the diverse approaches to our scripture, reason, and experience of our congregation and community
- Addressing our often unconscious bias against people who are different
- Helping to spread the message of inclusion to all, both inside and outside our Church

As a Church we need to be committed to a long-term process of reconciliation that leads to the healing of communities harmed by anti-LGBTQ+ policies, transforming animosity into loving relationships amongst all God's children. When we accomplish that, we will have a Church where all people get to thrive in the care of God's love.

BCCW

41st BCCW for September 2024 Point

The 41st annual BCCW is history. Generally, we feel that it was a successful workcamp, albeit we are never able to get to all the sites that we would like. (This year, of a total of 34 possible sites, 22 were completed or had some work done.) We do what we can with the number of volunteers and their levels of experience, as well as the weather conditions, whether thunderstorms or excessive heat and/or humidity.

The "Hunt's" team, led once again by Glenn Keatts, completed its typical two ramps during the week: one in Parkville and one in Randallstown. As it is normal, "Hunt's" had the longest of the five ramps built during the week (48'), plus also the second longest one (32'). The weather forecast was iffy for the entire week; however, except for Monday when it rained, the other four days were fine, albeit somewhat hot and humid, but certainly not the worse which we have endured.

This week was atypical for "Hunt's" team for several reasons:

- Monday saw a rain shower in the morning which was worked through and then a torrential downpour in the afternoon. Due to more rain forecasted to come, we stopped for the day. This was the earliest ever stoppage for us due to rain (around 2:00).
- Except for three "senior citizens" on the team, the rest of the crew were under 35 years old, which was the youngest "Hunt's" team probably ever.
- This year we had five different students from the Elite Core Martial Arts (at which Krista McMillan is
 the office manager; and David and Lizzie are managers, as well as Masters). Two worked four
 days, one worked two days, and the other two one day each, for a total of twelve workdays. (One
 had worked last year and returned!) They were all energetic and willing to help in different ways;
 at times, they were vying to do the same job.
- Typically, when we build a ramp at a site, for some reason, we always exceed whatever the initial estimate of the length of the ramp; however, in this case we were 2' under the estimate, which created some astonishment from the other teams.
- Our second site had no post holes to be dug.
- To do a field adjustment to improve the ramp slope on the Randallstown ramp after all the treads were in, we jacked up the lower landing and cut about 2" off the posts. (cont)

This was the first year that a Hunt's pastor has worked all five days during the week, plus Rev.
 Carissa was a BCCW Rookie. [Note—However, in her previous life, she has had workcamp type of experiences. During the week, she did all sorts of work tasks inherent with ramp building; many of which have been immortalized by photography.]

The "Hunt's" team consisted of Glenn and Linda Keatts, Steve Lippy, the McMillan clan (Dan, David, Joe, and Lizzie), Rev. Carissa Surber, and the Elite Core Martial Arts students [Ravi (12), Shriya (14), Bayan (15), Steven (15), and Ridhima (16)]. Even though not an official member of the "Hunt's" crew, Howard Lin, the BCCW's photographer, gave us preferential treatment (as he should!), plus greatly assisted our efforts by hauling supplies to and from the sites, and disposing of trash, as well as prepping Hunt's for the Sunday activities.

Parkville site: We started Monday morning, but stopped early. Tuesday was a long day as the three "senior citizens" did not leave until 6:50 pm. This site was completed by noon on Wednesday. The ramp was clocked in at 48'; this included a 9' porch overlay, one landing, and steps and a gate off the porch. There were eleven workers on both Monday and Tuesday, and eight on Wednesday morning.

Randallstown ramp: We left the first site after lunch on Wednesday to go to the second site, and initiated work. On Friday, this ramp was completed by 12:40 pm, which was our "short" day. It was 32' long with a small porch overlay and two landings; the ramp was all on concrete. In addition, a wedge ramp on the front porch was repaired, as well as a ramp into a shed. There were eight volunteers on Wednesday afternoon, ten on Thursday, and eight on Friday.

In addition to the work at sites during the main* BCCW week, the other activities were as follows:

- At Hunt's, a Sunday planning meeting, dinner (bought and prepared by BCCW volunteers), and orientation meeting.
- Tuesday evening dinner by Catonsville UMC at their church.
- Thursday evening dinner by Mt. Carmel UMC at their church.
- Saturday lunch at Epworth UMC (Cockeysville) at their church, followed by awards (Glenn got a BCCW "Wicked Witch of the West" shirt and Rev. Carissa got a BCCW Rookie shirt), and a communion service as a conclusion to the 2O24 BCCW.
- *We had another church group work the Saturday before and another work the week before, as they could not make it during our official work week.

In addition to appreciation and thanks to Glenn who undertook responsibility and leadership for "Hunt's" team again, and all of the other volunteers who worked on the "Hunt's" ramps during the week, we thank all who donated to Hunt's Advent and/or Lenten special offerings (as ½ was given to BCCW), those who helped Howard set up Van Metre Hall on Sunday after church, those who helped with serving food on Sunday (Kathleen Haller, Lynn and Walter Henss, and Suzanne and Dave Young), those who supported us with your prayers for a safe and successful week, as well as a general thank you to Hunt's for allowing us to hold our Sunday activities at Hunt's and giving us storage space in the garage. Let's Save a Life

Did you know that someone loses their life to suicide every 40 seconds? Suicide is the second leading cause of death among 15-29 year olds and affects people of all age groups in all countries. By increasing awareness of this issue, we can help to reduce the stigma and let people who are struggling know that they are not alone.

This month, we challenge you to honor World Suicide Prevention Day (September 10) by taking 40 seconds to prevent suicide:

- If you are struggling, take 40 seconds to kickstart a conversation with someone you trust about how you are feeling.
- If you know someone who has lost a loved one to suicide, take 40 seconds to start a conversation and ask them how they are doing.
- If you work in media, highlight the 40-second statistic in interviews, articles and blogposts.

 If you work in the arts or on digital platforms, interrupt your production or broadcast to transmit a 40-second message about mental health or preventing suicide. (cont)
- If you are an employer or manager, take 40 seconds to formulate a positive message of support to your employees about resources available to them in the workplace or local community in times of mental distress
- If you want your leaders to hear your request for action, record a 40-second audio clip or video telling them the action you want them to take on suicide prevention and mental health.
- If you have a platform for communicating with a large audience (social media, television, radio), provide 40-second slots for sharing mental health stories and messages.
- If you hold political office, communicate publicly about action you are taking to promote mental health and prevent suicide, highlighting the 40-second statistic.



Christian Education

Our church is passionate about the spiritual formation of all ages! We have a number of offerings planned for Fall 2024:

Nursery Care

One of our core values at Hunt's Church is loving children well. That's why we provide Nursery Care for children ages 3 and under during the 10am service each week. Financial News: Mid-Year Check-Up

Linda Keatts completed the accounting for July, so we can assess how we are doing seven months into the year. Below is our operating fund performance through the end of July:

Expenses continue to run modestly below what was budgeted. We are blessed that everyone is very cost conscious and tries to save money when possible. The significant number of volunteer hours also keeps our expenses down. Thank you.

In terms of income, the offering of \$233,596 is running 3.6% ahead of budget (\$225,421) and 5.1% ahead of last year (\$222,323). My hope is that we increase the gap with last year and budget as we enter autumn so we can minimize the projected year-end shortfall. Thank you for faithfully supporting the church and its many ministries and missions.

At its August meeting, the Finance Committee received a proposed budget from the Preschool Committee. It was quite thoughtfully developed and provided us with much detail. If actual enrollment is as expected, then the school appears poised to have another solid year, both programmatically and financially. Our church is blessed by the quality and dedication of all the individuals involved in this ministry – committee members, school leadership, school staff, and volunteers – what a team. The evolution of the after-school program continues this Fall and looks poised to elevate the experience for the kids enrolled in it – almost makes me want to be a kid all over again.
